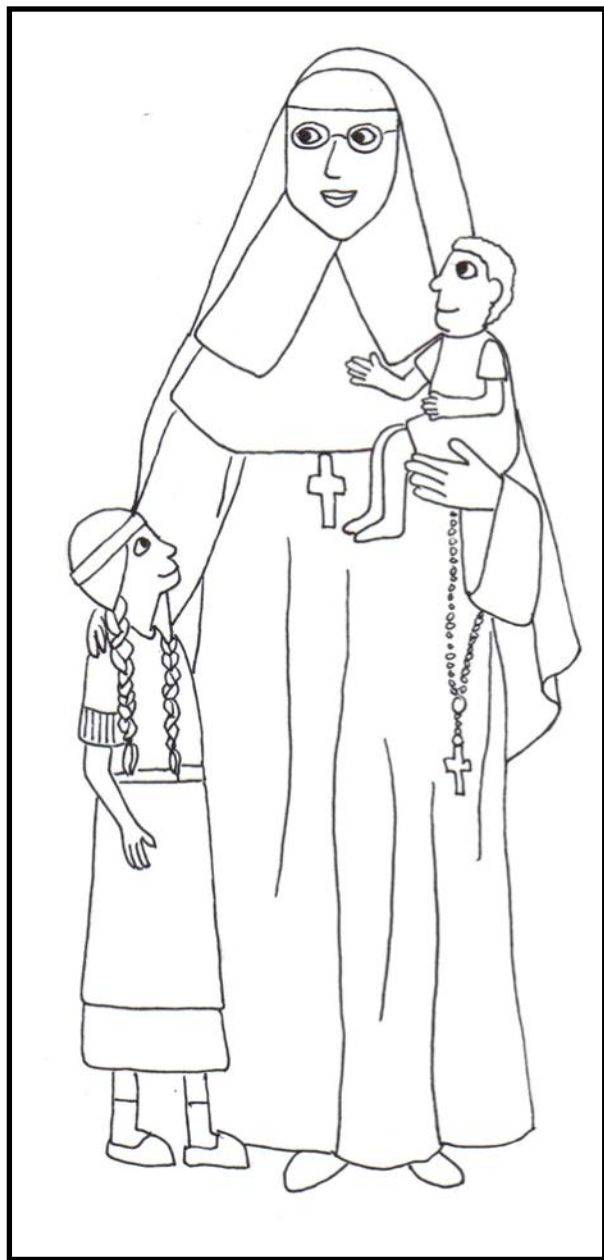


Saint Katharine Drexel



Saint Katharine Drexel was born on November 26, 1858 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Her mother passed away just five weeks after her birth, so she was just raised by her father and siblings. Katharine's father was an investment banker and so their family was very wealthy.

Katharine and her siblings were homeschooled, just like you! When they weren't learning, the Drexel family spent a lot of time living charitably. They handed out food, clothing and rent assistance and even sought widows and lonely single women who were too proud to come to their home for help.

When Katharine traveled west in 1884, she saw the harsh conditions of the Native Americans and wanted to help them. She helped both financially and personally. In January 1887 Katharine and her sisters had a private audience with Pope Leo XIII. They asked him for missionaries to staff some of the Native American missions they had been paying their own money to support. The Pope suggested that Katharine herself become a missionary! After some discernment, Katharine decided to give herself to God (along with her large inheritance from the family wealth) and devote her life to helping the Native Americans. In May 1889, Katharine entered the Sisters of Mercy Convent in Pittsburgh. It was a shock to her social circle and even

the newspaper carried a headline that read "Miss Drexel Enters Catholic Convent- Gives up Seven Million."

On February 12, 1891 Katharine professed her religious vows and officially dedicated her life to working with the Native Americans and African Americans in the western part of the US.

Katharine Drexel was beatified on November 20, 1988 and canonized on October 1, 2000 by Pope John Paul II. Her feast day is March 3.
